SURVEY ON SWEDISH LANGUAGE AMONG FOREIGN-LANGUAGE COMMUNITY IN FINLAND

- *Helsinki Times* newspaper and *SixDegrees* monthly conducted a survey among the foreign-language community in Finland about their perception, knowledge, skills and attitude towards the Swedish language.
- The survey form was published in *SixDegrees* issue 3/2009, *Helsinki Times* issue 13/2009 and on the *Helsinki Times* website.
- Only those whose mother tongue is other than Finnish or Swedish qualified for the study.

- A total of 510 people answered the survey.
- 61% of the respondents are men and 39% women.
- The respondents represent 79 nationalities and 71 languages as their mother tongue.
- 90% of the respondents speak at least one language fluently in addition to their own mother tongue.

BIGGEST GROUPS

- The biggest nationality groups: Germany 7.8%, the UK 6.7%, the US 6.1%, China 6.1%, India 5.7%, Nepal 4.5% and Russia 4.5%.
- The biggest mother-tongue language groups: English 22.4%, German 8.8%, Chinese 5.9%, Spanish 5.1%, Russian 4.9%, Nepali 4.3% and French 4.1%.






- 69% of the respondents live in the Helsinki Metropolitan Area, 5% in Turku and 5% in Tampere
- The biggest age group is 20–29-year-olds by 47.8%.
 20–39-year-olds make up almost 80% of the respondents.



- Almost 62% of the respondents are either married or cohabiting.
- 18.4% are single.
- The 3.6% listed as other are in a relationship/engaged, but living apart, divorced or are widow/ers.




- 64.5% of the respondents have an university degree.
- 84.3% have completed higher education in either a university, college or polytechnic.




REASON TO BE HERE

- 32.2% of the respondents say that they are in Finland for personal reasons.
- 31.4% came to work and 24.7% to study.
- 1.8% came for refuge (listed in other reasons).
- The other reasons that respondents listed were also personal e.g. spouses work, to be with family.



WHAT ARE YOU DOING?


- Almost 45% of the respondents are working full time.
- 27.5% are students.
- The 5.6% listed as other are e.g. on maternity leave, stay-at-home mothers or retired pensioners.

HOW LONG?

- Over 71% of the respondents have stayed in Finland less than five years.
- The amount of those who have lived in Finland over five years is a bit under 29%.



PUHUTKO SUOMEA?

- 57.5% of the respondents say that their level of
 Finnish language is poor or that they don't know any
 Finnish.
- Only 16.3% estimate their level of Finnish to be good or excellent.



WHAT DOES THE FOREIGN-LANGUAGE COMMUNITY KNOW ABOUT SWEDISH IN FINLAND?

- The majority of respondents answered correctly to questions related to the history and status of the Swedish language in Finnish society.
 - 81% knew that there was more than one official language before they moved to Finland.
 - 79.5% knew or guessed that the amount of Swedishspeaking population is 6% (multiple choice: 2%, 6%, 15% or 40%).
 - 74% knew or guessed that Finland was a part of Sweden until 1809 (multiple choice: 1500, 1809, 1880 or 1917).

WHAT DOES THE FOREIGN-LANGUAGE COMMUNITY KNOW ABOUT SWEDISH IN FINLAND?


- The majority of respondents answered correctly to questions related to the history and status of the Swedish language in Finnish society.
 - 82% knew that one can complete comprehensive school and study in Swedish.
 - 87% knew that there are Swedish-language newspapers and broadcasting in Finland.

WHAT DOES THE FOREIGN-LANGUAGE COMMUNITY KNOW ABOUT SWEDISH IN FINLAND?

- 47% of the respondents don't think that they have sufficient knowledge about the Swedish-language culture in Finland.
- 47% agree or strongly agree with the claim that the Swedish language is an essential part of Finnish society. 29% weren't sure.


HAVE YOU SUFFICIENT KNOWLEDGE OF THE SWEDISH LANGUAGE?


NEWS FROM FINLAND

- 76.5% of the respondents have some familiarity with the Swedish-speaking community through their studies, family and friends or through general information.
- The main reasons to get involved with the Swedishspeaking community are social contacts and business.





- 89.4% of the respondents estimate that their level of Swedish to be poor or they don't know any Swedish.
- 4.3% say their level of
 Swedish is good and only
 1.5% estimate their level of
 Swedish to be excellent.



NEWS FROM FINLAND

- 55.4% would definitely or probably like to learn Swedish.
- 67% would be ready to learn Swedish if it helped them with their career.
- 16.3% say that they have already learnt some Swedish in Finland.

- A profile of the respondent who is most likely to be definitely or probably interested in learning Swedish:
 - Student (72%*) or self-employed (79%*)
 - Young adult of 20–29 years old or under (64%*)
 - Has lived in Finland 2–4 years (62%*)
 - Has mediocre Finnish skills (58,5%*)


- Out of the seven biggest nationality groups, the Chinese (62.5%*), Indian (68.9%*), Russian (74%*) and Nepalese (82.5%*) were most interested in learning Swedish.
- There was no significant difference in the answers between men and women; over 55%* of both female and respondents would definitely or probably like to learn Swedish.

- Respondents' comments on why they would like to learn the Swedish language:
- "Because it is an essential part of society and Swedish is an official language here in Finland." (male from Netherlands)
- *"In order to move to a Swedish-speaking area or to Sweden."* (male from France)
- *"Job opportunities."* (female from Nigeria)
- "Official language that is definitely easier than Finnish." (female from Russia)
- "Part of good education." (female from Czech Republic)

NEWS FROM FINLAND

- 70% of the respondents agree or strongly agree with the claim that it would be easier for them to learn Swedish than Finnish
- 43.5% would consider doing their studies in Swedish, at least if it helped them with their career.
